Clubhouse Rental Tips

The Clubhouse is a perfect place to entertain for special occasions and host group functions. To reserve go to the Clubhouse tab on http://thegrovehoa.com/. New users need to click on the "Subscribe" link in the News and Alerts section of the webpage. This brings up a form requesting your residence information. Once you submit the form, you'll get a confirmation page. Within 48 hours you should receive an email with the user name and password. Access the Clubhouse online reservation system directly at http://thegrovehoa.com/clubhouse/clubhouse-rentals. Scroll down the page midway to the calendar section and click on the 31 day icon at the right. The calendar appears at the bottom. You can move forward or back through bookings by using the "month" arrows. Note: the Clubhouse is booked only once per day. To reserve a date, click "add new booking," then log in with the user name and password. Click on the + sign to the right of the date you want. This brings you to the "Add a booking page," which defaults to "Clubhouse." Click on the "Add" button to get to the "Add Booking" form. Complete the form and press the save button. You will get a confirmation email within 48 hours. The date appears orange until confirmed, then it changes to green. Clubhouse rules, fees, and booking can be found at the links on the Clubhouse tab http://thegrovehoa.com/clubhouse.

Holiday Shopping Safety

During the holiday shopping season, please be aware of your surroundings and follow these simple safety tips:

- If possible, shop during daylight hours.
- Avoid wearing excessive or expensive jewelry.
- Choose parking spaces in well-lit, high-traffic areas and as close to entrances as possible.
- Do not leave valuables visible inside your car. Purses, laptops, cameras, GPS units, portable music players and cash attract attention and tempt thieves.
- Always lock your car, even if you are leaving for only a short period of time. Make sure all windows, including the sunroof, are completely closed.
- Stay alert. Be aware of those around you. Offenders may try various methods of distracting you with the intention of taking your money or belongings.
- Never leave your purse or wallet unattended in a shopping cart.
- Avoid carrying multiple credit cards and large amounts of cash.
- Conceal your credit card numbers and personal identification numbers (PIN).
- Walk facing traffic so you can see approaching cars.
- Have keys in your hand as you approach your vehicle.
- Check the back seat of your car before entering.
- Never place packages or your purse on top of your vehicle.
- Immediately report suspicious persons and activities to police or mall security.

Online Shopping Tips

Know your merchant. Confirm the online seller's physical address and phone number before you buy. It comes in handy if you have questions or problems later.

Know what you're buying.

- Read the seller's description of the product and even though it can be painful, the fine print.
- Check out the terms and conditions. Can you return the item for a refund if you're not satisfied? Who pays the shipping costs? Is there a restocking fee? Print and save records of your online transactions, including all emails to and from the seller.
- Buy gift cards from sources you know and trust. Avoid buying cards from any online auction sites because they could be fake.

Be stingy with your personal information.

- Don't give out your credit card numbers or other financial information in exchange for an offer of the newest tech toy, a free gift card, a seasonal job or a holiday vacation rental.
- Don't email your financial information. Email isn't a secure way to transmit numbers—your credit card, your checking account or your Social Security number.
- Don't click on a link in an email. Legitimate companies don't ask for your financial information via email or pop-up message.

Check the privacy policy. It may be long, but it can give important information: for example, what personal information the website collects, why and how the operators are going to use it. If you can't find the privacy

policy—or understand it—consider taking your business elsewhere, and letting the site know what you think.

Pay by credit or charge card. Under federal law, you have the right to dispute charges under certain circumstances and withhold payment temporarily while the creditor is investigating. And if your card is used without your authorization, your liability generally ends at the first \$50.

Monitor your financial accounts. Read your statements regularly, making sure they reflect the charges you authorized.

We all enjoyed a fun afternoon with hot chocolate, cookies, and candy canes while our girls swapped presents.

But something was missing. After the party, I talked to my daughter about the meaning of Christmas and the gifts. Since the beginning, I have kept contact with the families who told me their needs and wishes. Now that I am a foster care worker, I've expanded the list of children we can help.

In 2011 we added two new girls to the group: Julia Clark and Ella Grace Bazemore. 2012 marks the fifth anniversary of our "Mom and Daughter Hot Chocolate" gathering. We would like to keep growing the cause. On December 16, us!

I believe that we are making memorable Mother-Daughter connections and contributing to a good cause. I am afraid that our girls are growing up so fast, but hope we can continue to hold this event every year. Andrea has known these girls ever since we moved from California in 2003 and to The Grove in 2004. It is so beautiful to keep such a wonderful friendship for so long.

What Should You Do to Get Ready for Winter Weather?

In late October, Hurricane Sandy brought heavy rain, wind, flooding and, yes, even snow to Virginia! It's not too early to get ready for winter weather.

Here are important tips for protecting yourself and your home:

- Get where you need to be before the weather gets bad. It's always best to stay off roads during winter storms. Most traffic crashes happen within the first two hours after a storm starts. Get road conditions by calling 511 or visiting www.511Virginia.org.
- If you heat with a fireplace or wood stove: Have a professional check it, especially if it has been a long time since the last cleaning. Residue can build up and cause fires.
- Safe use of space heaters: Never plug them into extension cords; plug into wall outlets. Keep space heaters at least three feet from other objects, and turn off before going to bed.
- Stay informed during power outages. Be sure you have a battery-powered and/or hand-crank radio (and extra batteries). Get one with the NOAA Weather Radio band so you can hear winter weather reports directly from the National Weather Service as well as local radio stations. These are available at electronics, discount and sporting goods stores, and online from many retail outlets. Models are available for those with special needs.
- **Don't use candles during power outages:** Many home fires in winter are caused by candles. Flashlights are much safer. Be sure to have plenty of extra batteries.
- Most importantly: You need a family emergency plan. If your family cannot return home because of severe weather or closed roads, you need to decide now on where you will meet to reunite. You also need an out-of-town relative or friend to be your family emergency contact. Learn more about making a plan for winter weather and all emergencies and get a free family emergency plan worksheet at www.ReadyVirginia.gov.
