# Mid-Lothian Mines and Rail Roads

#### EARLY HISTORY OF THE GROVE SHAFT 1836-01

The Grove Shaft plunged 625 feet and took workmen three years to dig. The Wooldridges employed 150 men and boys. Twenty-five mules stabled underground pulled coal carts on an underground railroad. Workmen, - white, free black, slave and boys as young as eight labored together using picks and shovels to dig and load the coal. They worked in two t2-hour shifts, 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. and from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m., six days a week. A company hospital, manned daily by three local physicians, attended to the miners' health needs.

Steam engines raised the coal in corves (coal buckets), that were dumped into cars of the Chesterfield Railroad. This gravity/horse-drawn railroad, Virginia's first, carried approximately 200 tons daily down to the James River wharves in Manchester in south Richmond. The coal was shipped to ports such as Washington, Baltimore and New York. It was used in blacksmiths' forges in the production of gas and coke, and in the manufacture of iron, glass, copper and chemicals, as well as being a source of energy.

LATER HISTORY OF THE GROVE SHAFT 1861-81

The Civil War increased the demand for local coal. From 1861-65, the Richmond and Danville Railroad hauled Mid-Lothian Company coal to the Tredegar Iron Works in Richmond to burn in casting cannons for the Confederacy.

Mining slowed after the end of the Civil War in 1865. Confederate veteran William B. Wooldridge failed in his postwar effort to issue stock to reorganize the Mid-Lothian Coal Mining Company. R.S. Burrows, his creditor from New York, took over to rework and reopen the mines. Tragedy struck in February 1882, when an explosion at the Grove Shaft entombed 32 workmen.

### THE GROVE SHAFT EXPLOSION

On February 3, 1882, a violent methane explosion trapped 32 men in the Grove Shaft. Miners from nearby Etna pits, the Deep Run pits in Henrico County and the Clover Hill pits, plodded through the snow to assist mine superintendent George Dodds in several furile rescue attempts.

Dr. Philip S. Hancock, a local mine physician, organized a relief committee to appeal to the public for donations. With the help of members of Jerusalem Baptist Church, known now as Winfree Memorial and the Midlothian Masonic Lodge, the group raised funds to assist the minera' families for many years with donations of food, rent money, fuel, clothing, school supplies and other necessities.

# Mid-Lothian Mines and Rail Roads

## LOCAL COAL MINING IN THE $18^{711}$ and $19^{711}$ centuries

Outcroppings of coal along the south bank of the James River in what is now Powhatan County were discovered circa 1700. A hunter from the nearby Huguenot settlement, Manakintown, dislodged lumps of coal as he slid down the riverbank to retrieve his quarry. Soon, nearby landowners began searching the area for coal outcroppings and deposits.

The earliest record of coal mined in the United States was that of a coal pit operated on the headwaters of Falling Creek near present Midlothian in 1737. Among local collieries working in the coal basin in the 18th and 19th centuries were Black Heath, Mills', Trabue's, Cunliffe's, Railey's, Brummall's Blunt's, Aerna, Gowrie, Stonehenge and Mid-Lothian.

## THE MID-LOTHIAN COAL MINING COMPANY

The Mid-Lothian Coal Mining Company was chartered in 1835 on a 404 acre tract by the heirs of William Wooldridge. The coal seam here was approximately 36 feet thick and 700 feet deep. Wooldridge issued stock to raise funds for machinery, construction and the sinking of shafts. There were four shafts, 11 by 11 feet square producing about 1 million bushels of coal yearly. The Mid-Lothian shaft (later known as the Pump Shaft), one of the most productive, was flooded following a disastrous explosion in 1855 that killed 55 miners. After several unsuccessful attempts to pump out and rework this once preeminent shaft, it was abandoned.

# Mid-Lothian Mines and Rail Roads

### WELCOME TO THE MID-LOTHIAN MINES PARK

The Mid-Lothian Mines Park is in the heart of Midlothian's coal mining past and is encompassed by the Richmond Coal Basin. Mining in the Midlothian area of the Basin represents the first attempt at commercial coal mining in North America. The Mid-Lothian Mines probably gave the village of Midlothian its name. The Richmond Coal Basin runs north and south and is approximately 33 miles long and 5 to 10 miles wide. It encompasses about 150 square miles in the counties of Henrico, Goochland, Hanover, Chesterfield, Powhatan and Amelia. The Richmond Coal Basin crosses the James River west of Richmond and the Appomattox River at its southern tip. Its bituminous coal seam, 5 to 50 feet thick, rests on an oblong granite basin.

### FORMATION OF COAL AS A FOSSIL FUEL

Coal in the Richmond Basin is an upper Triassic formation, compacted more than 160 million years ago. At that time, the Richmond area was a dense warm lowland forest/swamp of huge green trees and plants growing beside rivers, lakes and marshes bordered by granite hills. In this tropical forest grew giant pine-like trees with tall rushes underneath. Living in the warm swampland and waters were small lizard-like dinosaurs and ancient fish. As the animals, trees and plants died, they fell into the swamp and decayed. New animals, trees and plants grew on top of the old. Over millions of years, sediment, silt, sand and other mineral matter brought down by rain, rivers and streams covered layers of decaying matter. As mineral matter increased, some of it developed into sandstone and shale. These accumulating layers slowly compressed to form the coal bed. Paleontologists have found evidence in the shale and coal deposits that dinosaurs and crocodilelike creatures lived near Midlothian. Remains of early mammal-like reptiles and fish are among the most recent fossil discoveries. Petrified trees and giant rushes have been found in the Basin's sandstone beds

# Mid-Lothian Mines and Rail Roads

### COAL MINING CHRONOLOGY IN CHESTERFIELD

- 1835 Mid-Lothian Coal Mining Company is chartered.
- 1836 The Company organizes with 3,000 shares valued at \$100 each with 1,000 shares being sold to raise \$100,000 capital. The Wooldridge family contributes 404.5 acres valued at \$300,000. Four shafts are sunk: Pump Shaft, Middle Shaft, Grove Shaft and Wood Shaft.
- 1837 These pits produce only 70,000 bushels of coal. About 2,660 tons are moved by the Chesterfield (Gravity) Railroad.
- 1838 In March, 42 African-Americans, mostly slaves, are killed at Black Heath mine in the new 700-foot shaft.
- 1839 A 36 foot thick coal seam is hit 722 feet deep in Pump Shaft. Work in other shafts is stopped to mine this seam.
- 1840 Three hundred thousand bushels are extracted (11,400 tons) from Pump Shaft from the labor of 150 men and boys and 25 mules.

- 1843 The Reverend J.B. Jeter preaches sermons underground in mine.
- 1846 Miners, free blacks and slaves establish Mid-Lothian African Church, now the First Baptist Church of Midlothian.
- 1850 The steam powered Richmond and Danville Railroad opens Coalfield Station at Midlothian. The old Chesterfield (Gravity) Railroad is replaced.
- 1855 An explosion at Pump Shaft kills 55 men. Heavy flooding enters mine.
- 1856 Attempts to end the flooding problem by tapping into old mines fail with 10 men drowning.
- 1861 Mines are pumped out, but then catch fire. Equipment and supplies are abandoned.
- 1863 Richmond and Danville Railroad Spur line hauls coal from Grove Shaft to Richmond.
- 1867 Post Civil War attempts to revive mines fail. R.S. Burrows of New York provides \$180,000 to fund construction of Sinking Shaft, over 1,300 feet deep, but no coal is found.
- 1868 R.S. Burrows purchases site and under the direction of mining engineer Oswald Heinrich, the beginning of operations is plagued with many problems.

- 1870 At the first meeting of the Chesterfield County Board of Supervisors, a county seal is adopted showing: "a coal miner leaning on a pick under a pine tree with a flowing river at his feet."
- 1873 Operations begin at the re-opening of the Grove Shaft.
- 1876 An explosion of firedamp, a methane gas blast associated with coal mines, kills eight at Grove Shaft. Heinrich leaves the company.
- 1880 Approximately 13,122 tons of coal is produced from a seam measuring 4 2/3 feet thick.
- 1882 The Grove Shaft again explodes, killing 32 men.
- 1905 James River Coal Corporation builds a new incline track railroad only 900 ft. south of the Grove Shaft.
- 1906 Murphy Coal Corporation takes control, but because of lawsuits, ends coal mining in 1923.
- 1923 Coal mining operations gradually ceased.
