Board Term Limit Change

The Grove Board of Directors approved amending the bylaws to change Board term limitations at the HOA meeting in January. With a quorum of proxy ballots cast, the special meeting recessed in May was continued. An overwhelming majority of homeowners voted in favor of term increase. Effective with the November 2011 election, the top 2 directors getting the most votes will serve for two years. The other 3 directors will serve terms for one year.

Change To GHOA Meetings

Also at January's HOA meeting, the Board approved decreasing the frequency of Grove Homeowners meetings from monthly to bi-monthly. They are now scheduled for January, March, May, July, September, with the Annual HOA meeting and board election occurring every November, and board meeting in December. The date will still fall on the 2nd Thursday at 6:30 pm at the Clubhouse, unless otherwise posted.

Vandalism and Crime

Several communities in the Midlothian area have recently been plagued by nighttime vandals who search unlocked cars and garages for money, valuables, alcohol and weapons. Remember to roll up your car windows and to lock doors when leaving vehicles unattended. Also remember to keep your garage doors closed and locked. Items such as golf clubs, tools and beer are easy targets for theft. Exterior lighting is another powerful deterrent to crime.

Away from home, prevent the opportunity and stop the crime. Here are a few tips to help avoid being a victim.

 Try to park in well-lighted areas with good visibility and close to walkways, stores, and people.

Backflow Preventer Thefts

The GHOA needs your eyes and ears to prevent the possible theft of irrigation backflow preventers in our common areas. A number of communities in the local area have reported the loss of common area backflow preventers. They are being stolen and sold for brass and copper scrap. remove all fast growing species from the transmission right of way including but not limited to; Leyland Cypress, Cryptomeria, Weeping Willow, and Maple.

Dominion VA Power must maintain the vegetation at safe clearances as required by recently imposed federal standards. These trees require immediate action to avoid a violation of those standards to avoid significant fines. The easement which is attached to homeowners' properties gives Dominion the right to keep the right of way clear of trees.

Angel Wing" in Ducks and Geese Written By: Rachel Howard



"Angel wing" is a phenomenon that occurs in geese and ducks, both wild and domestic. The last joint of the wing becomes twisted and the wing points out. This renders the bird unable to fly and quite often it dies early particularly in wild birds. There is no conclusive research that I can find on the cause of angel wing, but it is widely known that it occurs exclusively in birds that are fed by humans. The two major theories are:

- (1) the diet consists of too much protein (14 16 % is advised) or
- (2) too many sugars usually due to the well meaning bread feeders at parks and recreational areas.

It is my concern that parks and recreation areas where it is likely that people will feed the wild and domestic ducks and geese bread, crackers and even popcorn, the signs saying Please Do Not Feed The Waterfowl are simply not enough to deter well meaning people. The public needs more information. Also, feed stores are often not well educated in what to offer the waterfowl. I found recently that the duck and goose food I was using to feed the local birds was much too high in protein.

This causes a much faster growth than the wings can bear. It's not the best idea to feed wild ducks and geese, but if they have taken up residence in an urban water habitat, or they have been bred by humans and released there (for various reasons) proper food is better than bread. Look for a balanced nutritional commercial feed for wild waterfowl, or run a search on the internet for a mix that can be made at home. PLEASE, No bread, No seeds, No popcorn, No potato chips. Again, if using a commercial wild waterfowl feed, no more than 16% protein.

This photo above shows a few of the pekins that I have been feeding. The one on the right has "angel wing". I have named him Angel. See the wings? They do not lay back against the body.

When waterfowl are fed bread the food turns into fat literally drowning the tissues of the bird, eventually resulting in death even though they appear healthy. The duck or goose is not hungry and will not forage for the good food which is his staple diet. Waterfowl become bread dependent. They become more aggressive as well. It is important to educate the public. Children need to understand as well.

OTHER GEESE FACTS

- Geese mate in February and March and resident geese are in pairs, not in flocks
- Nest in late March-May geese and ganders become very aggressive at this time to protect their nests. If you see a lone gander "patrolling" a certain area, that means that there are nests nearby.
- Discourage homeowners from feeding geese/ goslings May-July - if there is no food, they will look for somewhere else to forage.

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
