Things you need to know in The Grove

Bylaws Proxy - All owners must return this ballot.

The Grove Homeowners Association held a special meeting of the membership on Wednesday, May 12, 2010 at 7pm at the community clubhouse. The meeting was called to vote on a bylaws amendment to increase the term for Board members from one year to two years.

The Association documents require two-thirds (66.6%) or 500 of the 750 homeowners in the community to approve a Bylaws Amendment. At the time of the meeting on May 12, only 220 proxy/ballots had been returned. Therefore, the meeting was recessed instead of adjourned to continue the process of obtaining additional proxy/ballots to approve this important amendment. The May 12th meeting will continue in recess until the required number of proxy/ballots has been received.

If you have not already returned your proxy, please see if you still have it or simply go to www.thegrovehoa.com and print one off. You have several ways to return it. Mail it to Community Group at 4222 Cox Road, Suite 110, Glen Allen, VA 23060. Fax it to Community Group at 346-8640. Deliver it to Steve Judd (Grove Vice President), 1513 Hawkins Wood Circle.

Proxies must be signed by all legal owners of the unit to be valid.

Architectural Review

A reminder that the planting and removal of trees requires approval!

ARTICLE VII - ENVIRONMENTAL COVENANTS: In order to protect the natural beauty of the vegetation, topography or other natural features within the Subdivision, the following environmental controls are hereby established.

7.01. Trees. To the extent reasonably practical, the clearing of mature trees on Lots shall be limited to those areas required to accommodate the residence to be constructed thereon and its normal and customary accessories, open front yard areas and those areas required to permit utility services and driveways. No trees measuring six (6) inches in diameter at a point two (2) feet above ground level which are located more than twenty (20) feet away from the residence or structure constructed on the Lot, shall be removed without the prior written approval of the Architectural Control Committee.



Some other things that need ARC approval are: changing paint colors, additions, sheds, play equipment, swing sets, decks, landscaping changes, irrigation, new driveways and sidewalks, etc. Basically anything you do to alter the outside of your home including anything on your property.

HOW THE ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW PROCESS WORKS

In an effort to streamline the exterior modification application process, the Modifications Committee is now using a new web-based service to review modification requests. Requests are now loaded onto the web-based program, where committee members and the HOA board may review, discuss and decide on applications as they are received. Owners are then notified of decisions via email, so please be sure to include your email address on your application. This new system also provides for better record-keeping of approved requests.

Owners can download applications from the Grove website and then mail the application to: The Grove Homeowners Association, c/o Community Group, 4222 Cox Road, Suite 110, Glen Allen, Virginia, 23060. For faster processing, owners may (and are encouraged to) scan and email their applications and supporting documentation directly to Carolyn Grimes at email@communitygroup.com. Photos may be emailed in any format. Faxed applications are also acceptable at 346.8640 but may be more difficult to read. Please be sure to include The Grove's application along with any requested documentation.

An Opportunity to Help

This February, I went on a life-changing trip to Haiti. My church has a twinning relationship with a small town called Cerca Carvajal on the central plateau. The church has been making yearly trips to Haiti for the past ten years, conducting a medical clinic, restocking medical supplies, taking individual pictures of the 700 school children there, and spending time in solidarity with the people.

We arrived in Cerca Carvajal on February 25. The people there were extremely welcoming and went out of their way to offer their best hospitality. The group from our church consisted of two nurses, a dental hygienist, a pharmacist, and a doctor to run the clinic as well as five others including myself. As a high schooler, I wasn't sure how much help I could offer but when the children went out to play after school, I was able to spend a lot of time talking to them and playing games. They don't have playgrounds or toys, but the children of Cerca are never bored. We brought soccer balls and jump ropes for them, and they were extremely grateful. They all go to a cleared field of dirt and rocks after school to play soccer and jump rope. They also make up games and tell jokes and laugh constantly. Despite their poverty, the children of Haiti never stop laughing. Even though the native language of Haiti is Creole, I did not have any problem communicating with them. In school, they speak and learn in French which is the language of the educated in Haiti, and study English and Spanish. They also taught me how to count in French, and enjoyed laughing at me when I forgot a number. I made many friends there, and plan to return next year to see them.

Because this trip had such a huge impact on my life, when I got home I wanted to do something more. I

read an article about a freshman at William and Mary, Danny Yates, who was in Haiti during the January 12 earthquake. He had become friends with some Haitian university students, whose school has collapsed in the earthquake. Without their school, these students would not be able to finish their education. Since the earthquake, Danny has secured six spots at Barber Scotia College in North Carolina for the students he met. The school has offered them scholarships equivalent to 2/3 of tuition. However, the students still need money for room and board, books, clothes, etc. Danny talks to the students every day and will go to Haiti in early August to bring the students here so they can start school in the fall. His goal is to raise \$30,000 by August 1. These students are eager to learn and have been working on their English daily. They intend to use their education to help rebuild Haiti. Some of the careers the students are pursuing are in the field of medicine, dentistry, and engineering, which are in great need in Haiti. If you want NEW DVD releases, just click on the blue FEATURED LISTS link and then scroll within that menu.

Still can't find it? Use the advance search function to refine your search by branch, audience, year, and any other relevant information.



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If you're still bored, consider volunteering at the library. Recent county budget cuts caused a 20% reduction in staff.

Starting July 1, all branches except Central will be closed on Thursdays.
