No Dogs Allowed at Playground

By now you Moms and Dads have probably discovered the new playground equipment installed at The Clubhouse. There's a wave slide, pod climber, sea creature climber, horizontal and vertical ladders, and a ship's wheel for kids to explore. But to protect our kids from hygiene and safety issues, **DOGS ARE NOT PERMITTED IN THE PLAYGROUND**. There is a risk of spreading the toxocariasis parasite found in feces from affected dogs to children playing on the ground and the equipment. Even if the feces are removed, the parasite remains in the soil and spreads to children. There are also concerns for kids with allergies to dogs as well as children having fears and phobias to getting bitten by dogs.

Architectural Review Rules

All Grove residents making any changes or additions to your home or landscaping need to get prior ARC approval. Major additions must be staked for visual reference to assess impact to adjoining properties. Scotter Hills and Ridgemoor residents must apply ONLY to The Grove ARC. The HOA has 30 days to review submissions to ARC. For complete details see www.thegrovehoa.com Covenants & Bylaws tab. Homeowners whose property backs up to the walking paths should periodically check their shrubbery and trees for overhanging branches inhibiting people's progress on the paths.

COMMUNITY GROUP AFTER HOURS COVERAGE

To report urgent or life threatening issues after normal business hours (after 5 p.m. and before 9:00 a.m.), please contact Community Group, 804-270-1800 and follow the prompts for the 24 hour On Call Manager. Please DO NOT call Board members or leave messages on the regular Community Group inbox – those calls are not returned until the following business day. The On Call Manager can handle any urgent request immediately. Home Sales in The Grove Require Disclosure Packages

Residents selling their home must purchase an updated disclosure book from the HOA to give to their buyer (for the Grove book contact Community Group 804-270-1800, Krim Point and Scotter Hills/Ridgemoor request those additional books from your HOA). Your buyer has 3 days to review the documents once in hand. The Virginia Statutes allows up to 14 calendar days for processing the disclosure book request. If a book is needed sooner, an additional rush fee of \$58.65 is required. The fees for purchasing a disclosure book consist of \$146.70 for the actual disclosure book and \$117.30 for the resale inspection of the home's exterior to ensure that architectural guidelines set in place by the association are in compliance. In addition, there is a post closing fee of \$58.65 that is charged at every sale to the buyer. It is an administrative fee to remove the previous owner from the address account and set up the new buyer account. Any major additions to the exterior of your home or landscaping should have been approved by the Architectural Review Committee (ARC). Failure to do so may hold up closing if the buyer balks at violations/non-compliance issues. Call Community Group to make sure any additions, such as a fence, shed, patio, swing set, satellite dish, etc. made by the previous owner of your home was approved by ARC.

ARC Guidelines Regarding Trees

Planting & removal of trees requires ARC approval! ARTICLE VII - ENVIRONMENTAL COVENANTS: In order to protect the natural beauty of the vegetation, topography or other natural features within the Subdivision, the following environmental controls are hereby established. 7.01. Trees. To the extent reasonably practical, the clearing of mature trees on Lots shall be limited to those areas required to accommodate the residence to be constructed thereon and its normal and customary accessories, open front yard areas and those areas required to permit utility services and drive-ways. No trees measuring six (6) inches in diameter at a point two (2) feet above ground level which are located more than twenty (20) feet away from the residence or structure constructed on the Lot, shall be removed without the prior written approval of the Architectural Control Committee.



Mailbox Improvement

If the post and wooden paper box is in good condition, apply a new coat of paint, but if deteriorated, replace it. Approved dark hunter green boxes (item #E1600G00) can be purchased in-store through Pleasants Hardware/Midlothian Station Shopping Center, or ordered online (not in stores) at

www.homedepot.com. If your mailbox numbers need replacement visit Pleasant Hardware/Midlothian. They must be painted in dark hunter green gloss to match mailbox. The mailbox numbers as seen in the photo may be purchased only at Pleasants. Mailbox can be repainted using Rustoleum Dark Hunter Green gloss protection enamel spray paint. You can find this at Lowe's as well as other hardware supply stores. Many home repair companies offer mailbox refurbishing services, but make sure they adhere to bylaw standards. Grove resident John Romano provides repairs and replacements to mailboxes and posts (see page 11).

(Please have the number from the light and address or cross streets) If Chesterfield says it is in the system, you can then call Dominion at 888-667-3000 to report it and all subsequent issues. If it is a street sign issue, email BelcherJ@Chesterfield.gov. If it is a road issue, go to: https://my.vdot.virginia.gov. Use this link to report road repairs directly to VDOT. If you create an account, they will email you with updates on the progress of your request.

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
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Declutter Your Home, One Area at a Time

The easiest way to clear your home of unwanted clutter is to designate five bins or containers to help you sort your belongings into categories that you either keep or discard. Use these containers to tackle one room/area at a time:

Put Away: This box is for items that did not get filed back into their appropriate storage spaces. This could mean a coffee cup in the bathroom or a sweatshirt in the kitchen. Put them into their designated spots.

Recycle: This bin is for recyclables, such as paper, plastic or glass.

Fix/Mend: Use this box for belongings that need repair, such as a pair of shoes that you love but which need to be cleaned.

Trash: Use one basket for things that are simply trash that can be purged immediately.

Donate: Slate one bin for gently used items that you can donate to a church, charitable organization, or another person.

The Bathroom

Clear out your medicine cabinet. Take everything out and discard outdated medications, makeup, and skincare products. Put everything you're keeping immediately back into the cabinet, storing the items you use most often at eye level.

Tackle cabinet drawers. Remove everything, do a quick evaluation of what you're keeping and what you're tossing. Put the items you're going to keep back into their drawers, with the items you use most often in the top drawers.

Ditto with your shower/tub and bathroom sink. Finally, everything that did not have a home can be quickly sorted into the five baskets or bins you have staged for the purpose.

The Bedroom

Clear your nightstands of things that do not belong there and put it in your *Put Away* bin. Any broken items or trash or recyclables should go into the appropriate bins.

Do the same with the tops of your dressers, chests, and/or bureaus.

Go through each bureau, drawer by drawer. Take everything out. Pull out anything that is no longer worn and put it in your *Donation* bag or box. Fold and store everything you're keeping.

If you keep a desk or vanity table in your bedroom, tackle that next. Things that do not belong go in your *Put Away* bin. Toss or recycle any garbage or anything you haven't used in more than six months. Return items to their proper places. Fold or hang and store any clothing.

Closet and Clothing

The easiest way to declutter a closet is to first declutter your clothing by type. Start with shoes, then boots, then dresses, etc. t's much easier to decide to toss or keep a pair of jeans if you're looking at your entire jean collection at once. Once you've gone through each type of clothing, you will have four piles to deal with: items to put away, to repair, to clean, or to donate.

The Entryways, Mudroom, and Foyer

You may not have a traditional mudroom or foyer, but you definitely have an entryway, which needs regular decluttering. Any desk, console, or side table drawers should be reviewed by going through each drawer, removing the contents, and make a quick decision to toss or keep each item. Go over the tops of each desk or console as well. Do you have a space for your keys and other essential items? Make sure everything is accessible and uncrowded, for quick and stress free getaways in the morning. The hall closet should be decluttered like any other closet: Start with shoes and boots, then jackets, followed by accessories.

The Kitchen

Since the kitchen is a multi-purpose room (cooking, eating, socializing, kid's homework, etc.), keeping it clutter-free can be a challenge. Focus on one category of item at a time (cutting boards, glassware, utensils, or bakeware, for example) or going by zone through each part of the kitchen. Empty each space, assess each item, and put everything back where it belongs. Start with your powerhouse storage spaces first, such as the pantry and upper cabinets. Then move onto the lower cabinets, drawers, the space under the kitchen sink. Finally, concentrate on your countertops. Move as many items as possible off of the countertops and into storage spaces. Keep only what you use every single day on the countertops. Finally, take your *Put Away* bin and return anything that doesn't belong in the kitchen to its rightful storage space elsewhere in the house.

The Living /Family Room

Depending on the construction of this room, you may or may not have appropriate storage for the room's functionality. So decide on permanent storage spaces for commonly used items such as remote controls, magazines, and books. Declutter this space regularly. Start with bookcases, console, and side tables. Then move onto your coffee table and entertainment center. Empty them, assess the items they store and then return them to their proper storage spaces. Put books away, action your mail, return remote controls to their proper places, fold blankets, etc. Move onto electronics. Remove everything that is not connected to your television or home theater system. Are you using it? Does it work? Store items like chargers, gadgets, and gaming equipment where you use them. Finally, tackle the toys. Assess every toy for wear and tear. Does it still function? Do your kids still play with it? Recycle or store each toy. Return any out of place items to their proper storage locations.

Spring Forward ON Sunday March 8 at 2 AM!

Turn your clocks 1 hour forward before you go to bed on Saturday March 7th.

It's also a good time to schedule maintenance on essential household items:

Replace smoke alarm batteries and test the alarm.

Check your carbon monoxide monitors.

Clean your dryer vent. The dryer vent should be cleaned at least every six months to prevent fire hazards.

Check all your appliance filters to ensure optimum efficiency. This includes furnace and air conditioning air filters, vacuum cleaners, refrigerator water filters, dishwasher filters, and air purifiers and humidifiers.

Schedule a cooling system check. Make sure your HVAC is working properly before the heat of summer hits.

Have your water heater drained to remove sediment and improve efficiency. This should done once a year.

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Berry Nuts Granola Bars

Granola bars aren't just easy to make, they can also be sculpted based on your tastes. Add anything from sunflower seeds to flaked unsweetened coconut to a variety of nuts and nut butters. Make them yummy for kids with one or two tablespoons of chocolate chips!

180 Calories/5.4g Protein/4.2g Fiber Per Serving

1 cup dried, unsweetened cranberries
2 cups old-fashioned oats, divided
1/2 cup sliced, unsalted almonds
1/4 cup flax seeds
pinch salt
2 tablespoon canola oil
1/4 cup maple syrup or honey
1/3 cup reduced-fat peanut butter


Preheat the oven to 325 degrees F. Prepare an 8-inch by 8-inch baking dish by lining by it with parchment paper. In the bowl of a food processor, add cranberries; process until the cranberries are chopped a bit, about 30 seconds to 1 minute. Add 1 cup of oats; continue to puree until oats are a flour-like consistency. Transfer mixture to a large bowl. Into the bowl, add remaining 1 cup oats, almonds, flax seeds, and salt. Stir together to combine. In a heatproof container, add oil, maple syrup, and nut butter. Warm in the microwave until the nut butter is soft and pliable, around 30 seconds to 1 minute. Stir mixture together with a spoon until smooth. Pour nut butter mixture over oat mixture. Use a spatula to thoroughly combine. Transfer to the prepared baking dish. Wet your hands and press down on the mixture to help it stick together. Cook in the oven for 30 minutes. Remove and let cool slightly. Press down on mixture again to stick together. Cover the top with plastic wrap and place in the refrigerator at least a few hours (or preferably overnight) to harden. Lift parchment paper from baking dish. Use a serrated knife and cut the granola bars into 12 pieces. Serve or transfer to an airtight container for 1 week.

Cooking Tips: When measuring sticky items like maple syrup or honey, coat the measuring cup with cooking spray first so the honey or maple syrup comes out easily. Unsweetened freeze-dried fruit can be substituted for dried cranberries. Roughly chop 1 cup freeze-dried blueberries and/ or strawberries and fold into the granola bar mixture right at the end before pouring into the pan.

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Schedule Your Irrigation Backflow Prevention Tests Now!

To ensure public water remains potable, the State of Virginia Health Department and Building Codes require annual inspections of all irrigation system backflow prevention units. The yearly inspection and test must be performed within thirty days of irrigation system start-up. *Homeowners who do not comply with the mandate can be fined.* Before hiring a backflow inspector, confirm they are a certified "Backflow Prevention Device Worker."
